ESSAY PROMPT

NOTE: Contestants who do not write an essay will be disqualified. Essay length is not a major grading factor as long as the essay is substantial and demonstrates a sincere effort to discuss the assigned topic. Cover as many corners of the issue as practical, including historical, political, economic, social and cultural, when relevant. Avoid including your personal opinions, as more than enough information on the subject has been published. A focused, concise and specific essay beats a vague and rambling essay.

Topic

Per constitutional mandate, the 117th Congress convened Jan. 3 at noon, bringing an influx of new lawmakers to Capitol Hill amid the ongoing pandemic. Newly elected and returning members took the oath of office.

Immediately, Congress — both the House and the Senate — faced controversial issues, some that forced votes and public dissension, those first days. Discuss three of the issues that Congress faced in those early days from Jan. 3 until the inauguration Jan. 20.

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ANSWER KEY

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POTENTIAL DISCUSSION POINTS PREPARED Jan. 12, 2020 might include, but should not be limited to...

- Leadership Representative Nancy Pelosi (CA-12) was re-elected Speaker and will preside over the chamber for the next two years. Representative Steny Hoyer (MD-5) was elected majority leader, and Representative Kevin McCarthy (CA-22) was elected minority leader. With her party in control of just 222 of 435 seats, Pelosi can afford to lose only a handful of Democrats on any given vote. Pelosi, who has led her party in the House since 2003 and is the only woman to be speaker, received 216 votes to 209 for McCarthy.
- Georgia Control of the Senate was in the balance until a runoff election Jan. 6 when two Democrats, Jon Ossoff and Raphael Warnock, won their elections in tight races. Warnock, pastor at the Ebenezer Baptist church in Atlanta, the church where Martin Luther King Jr, the civil rights leader, often preached here became the first African American senator from Georgia. With democratic victories in both Georgia runoff elections, the U.S. Senate will be evenly split, 50-50. Vice President Kamala Harris would cast any deciding vote needed.
- Death Luke Letlow, a Republican and congressman-elect from Louisiana, died Dec. 29, 2020 from complications of COVID-19 days before he was set to be sworn into office. He was 41. Given how slim the Democratic majority was in the House, any changes were watched closely.
- Pandemic Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the first day of the 117th
 Congress was modified to accommodate guidelines from the Office of Attending
 Physician, such as social distancing, reducing the number of guests and staff
 allowed in the chamber, and mask wearing. Late last year, Congress passed
 legislation giving most Americans \$600. Democrats wanted more and the
 incoming administration pledged to get more vaccinations out faster and to get
 out more relief money.
- Biden election With mounting desperation, Trump declared he would "fight like hell" to hold on to the presidency and appealed to Republican lawmakers to reverse his election loss to Joe Biden when they convened to confirm the Electoral College vote. Trump enlisted support from a dozen Republican senators and up to 100 House Republicans to challenge Biden's win. The tally tipped the win to Biden and Harris at 3:31 a.m. ET. The counting finally ended at 3:40 a.m. Biden got 306 electoral votes to Trump's 232
- *Mob invades Capitol* On Jan. 6, hundreds of pro-Trump protesters pushed through barriers set up along the perimeter of the Capitol, where they tussled with officers in full riot gear, some calling the officers "traitors" for doing their jobs. About 90 minutes later, police said demonstrators got into the building and officials locked the doors to the House and Senate. Ultimately, five people died and 14 police officers were injured. More than 50 people were arrested in the week after. The FBI said pro-Trump and far-right online networks planned "armed protests" in all 50 state capitals and in Washington, D.C., leading to Biden's inauguration.
- *Impeachment* The House seems prepared to pass Articles of Impeachment for incitement of insurrection. If passed, U.S. President Donald Trump would be the first president to be impeached twice. It was unclear whether the Senate would hear the case before April. It was unclear whether Vice President Mike Pence would invoke the 25th Amendment with a majority of the Cabinet.
