

Avoid including your personal opinions, as more than enough information on the subject has been published. A focused, concise and specific essay beats a vague and rambling essay.

Benjamin Wallace-Wells wrote in *The New Yorker*: "When politicians or commentators talk about 'cancel culture,' they are typically speaking of a fear that even ordinary people who express ideas that are politically incorrect will be publicly shamed—that social media has enabled a universal speech surveillance, and that people and institutions are now self-policing, out of fear of it."

And, as Aja Romano wrote on Vox of a resolution passed at the 2020 Republican National Convention: "The resolution described 'cancel culture' as having 'grown into erasing of history, encouraging lawlessness, muting citizens, and violating free exchange of ideas, thoughts, and speech.' "
