ESSAY PROMPT

The statement from the White House on Jan. 20 began, "President Biden is sending a bill to Congress on day one to restore humanity and American values to our immigration system." But over the next few months, what happened along America's southern border, a border with Mexico, was frustrating for the Biden administration as well as state and local officials and seen as anything but humane by observers from both parties.

Describe some of the challenges local, state and federal officials have faced in recent months along the border, what might be behind the problems at the border and what is being done about these problems.

POTENTIAL DISCUSSION POINTS PREPARED April 12, 2021 might include, but should not be limited to...

- The Problem Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro N. Mayorkas, March 16, 2021: "We are on pace to encounter more individuals on the southwest border than we have in the last 20 years. We are expelling most single adults and families. We are not expelling unaccompanied children. We are securing our border, executing the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) public health authority to safeguard the American public and the migrants themselves, and protecting the children. We have more work to do."
- Children Mayorkas: "We are encountering many unaccompanied children at our southwest border every day. The Border Patrol facilities have become crowded with children and the 72-hour time frame for the transfer of children from the Border Patrol to HHS is not always met." The number of unaccompanied children crossing the border in March reached more than 18,500, according to preliminary Customs and Border Protection data obtained by NBC News, smashing the previous record as the Biden administration scrambles to set up new shelters to accommodate them. The daily average as of March 23 is up from around 500 earlier this month, and far surpasses the height of the 2019 surge of migrant families, when Border Patrol apprehended around 370 unaccompanied children a day on average.
- The wall To pick up border wall construction where former President Donald Trump left off, Texas House Rep. Bryan Slaton, R-Minel a, has introduced HB 2862 that would see the construction of a border wall along the Texas-Mexico border. According to Customs and Border Patrol, 281 miles of border wall have been completed or are under construction as of the beginning of the year. Texas and Mexico share 1,254 miles of common border.
- Biden perception The president campaigned on easing immigration controls, including a moratorium on deportations, an end to former U.S. President Donald Trump's "wait in Mexico" policy for asylum-seekers and halting construction of the border wall. Biden's platform gave migrants reason to believe it would be easier to get into the U.S. if he were elected. Despite the numbers, the Biden administration has avoided calling it a "crisis."
- Immigration bill Since taking office, Biden has also given potential immigrants good reason to think they might be allowed to stay. His immigration bill, the U.S. Citizenship Act of 2021, would offer legal status and a pathway to citizenship to much of the U.S. undocumented population.
- Escaping El Salvador, Guatemala, and Honduras While the U.S. will continue to support asylum seekers and other vulnerable populations, Biden's legislation allocates \$4 billion to address the underlying causes of immigration in the region.
 - Honduras Widespread gang violence fuels the instability and suffering.
 Criminals have extorted Hondurans into paying an arbitrary "war tax" for
 their survival, and those who can't pay often are killed. Some of the migrants
 are transgender people who faced persecution.
 - *El Salvador* Poor economic conditions and natural disasters also have contributed to Salvadorans fleeing their country.
 - *Guatemala* More than half of Guatemala lives in poverty, and 23% lives in extreme poverty meaning people live on less than \$1.25 a day.
