A focused, concise and specific essay beats a vague and rambling essay.

#### **PROMPT**

The Texas Legislature meets in regular session for no more than 140 days every other year. In 2023, however, the Texas Legislature continued meeting for the trial of the attorney general and in four special sessions by year's end totaling almost as many days as the regular session. Discuss the actions legislators took — or didn't take — during the third and fourth special sessions as well as the trial of the attorney general.

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# POTENTIAL DISCUSSION POINTS PREPARED Jan. 10, 2024 might include, but should not be limited to...

- Costs A full 30-day session amounts to about \$1 million in per diem payments to lawmakers meant to cover their expenses in Austin.
- First session The first special session ended June 27, 2023, with no new laws.
- Second session The second special session ended July 13, 2023.
- Paxton trial After 10 days, the Texas Senate on Sept. 16, 2023, acquitted Attorney General Ken
  Paxton of 16 articles of impeachment alleging corruption and bribery, his most artful escape in a
  career spent courting controversy and skirting consequences of scandal. No article received more
  than 14 of the required 21 votes to convict. Only two of 19 Republican Senators voted in favor of
  convicting for any article a stark contrast to the more than 70% of House Republicans who
  impeached the attorney general in May.
- Third session Texas lawmakers came into the third special session, which started in October, focused on education, primarily around the issues of school vouchers and teacher raises. But other issues came up as well, as Gov. Greg Abbott prioritized border security-related legislation. The third special legislative session ended with a whimper morning without a deal on school vouchers Abbott's top priority as well as several border security bills he had asked for. The session produced laws that will bolster GOP dominance in the state's new political maps, restrict transgender student athletes from playing on sports teams that align with their gender identity and dole out federal COVID-19 relief funds to programs across the state. Senate Bill 7, a bill that could ban private employers from having mandates that require someone to have the COVID-19 vaccine as a condition of their employment or position, passed and was signed into law Nov. 10, 2023.
- History Never before has the governor called a fourth special session the same year as the
  regular session, underscoring the gridlock Abbott has faced this year as he has pushed lawmakers
  to pass his priorities. Four special sessions are unusual but not unheard of. There were previously
  10 times in Texas history where a governor called at least four special sessions after a regular
  session, the most recent being 2004.
- Fourth session Abbott's agenda for the fourth session included four items: boosting funding for schools, including through the creation of a voucher program; school safety measures; legislation to create criminal offenses for crossing the Texas-Mexico border illegally; and funding for border walls and border security operations, including more police for the Liberty County community of Colony Ridge. Legislators left vouchers, school safety and elections bills unfinished at year's end. The casualties of lack of bipartisan cooperation included Senate Bill 5, which would have spent \$800 million on school safety measures through 2025, and Senate Bill 6, which would have changed the timeline of a trial after an election contest was filed by a citizen or group. Legislators failed to reach explicit agreement on moving forward on big-ticket items like teacher pay raises. School vouchers lost out on an 84-63 bipartisan vote in support of an amendment by state Rep. John Raney (R-College Station), which removed the Educational Savings Account provision from the omnibus legislation. Abbott said that if lawmakers do not pass vouchers during the fourth special session, he will use it as an issue against recalcitrant members of his party in the primary. Legislation to make crossing the Texas-Mexico border illegally a violation of state law did pass and Abbott signed it into law. In fact, Abbott traveled to the Rio Grande Valley to sign three bills that pour more money into his three-year effort to deter illegal immigration at the Texas-Mexico border and give Texas law enforcement authority to arrest undocumented immigrants anywhere in the
- School vouchers Educational savings accounts, also known as school vouchers, were not approved in the first four special sessions. Abbott may call the Legislature back for a fifth session in 2024. Abbott, who had threatened lawmakers with more special sessions to pass the proposal, seems to have turned his attention to punishing voucher opponents in this fall's primary elections.
- Six is the record— The record number of sessions came in 1989-90 for the 71st legislature, which had six special sessions.
