

#### ESSAY PROMPT

# POTENTIAL DISCUSSION POINTS PREPARED Jan. 6, 2025 might include, but should not be limited to...

- Record-breaking global temperatures: 2024 was the warmest year on record according to the World Meteorological Organization. The global average temperature in September was 1.26°C above NASA's baseline. October 2024 ranked as the second-warmest October in NOAA's 175-year global climate record. The average temperature of the contiguous U.S. in November was 45.3°F, 3.6°F above average, ranking sixth warmest in the 130-year record. The YTD global surface temperature was 2.3°F above the 20th-century average, making it the warmest such period on record. Africa, Europe, North America, Oceania and South America each had their warmest YTD period. Changes to Earth's climate driven by increased human emissions of heat-trapping greenhouse gases are already having widespread effects on the environment: glaciers and ice sheets are shrinking, river and lake ice is breaking up earlier, plant and animal geographic ranges are shifting, and plants and trees are blooming sooner.
- Long-term changes: According to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change the United
  Nations body established to assess the science related to climate change modern humans have
  never before seen the observed changes in our global climate, and some of these changes are
  irreversible over the next hundreds to thousands of years. "The scientific evidence is unequivocal:
  climate change is a threat to human wellbeing and the health of the planet. Any further delay in
  concerted global action will miss the brief, rapidly closing window to secure a livable future."

- Devastating floods in Valencia, Spain: The worst floods to hit Spain in decades on Oct. 29 killed
  at least 230 people, covered towns in mud and debris, destroyed bridges, roads and rail lines
  and submerged cars, mainly in the eastern region of Valencia. In places like Chiva, a town near
  Valencia, a year's worth of rain fell in just eight hours, according to Spain's meteorological agency.
  Climate change is the main driver of record-breaking hot oceans. When ocean waters are hotter,
  storms can suck up additional moisture.
- Severe drought and wildfires in the northeastern U.S.: Drought has parched the Northeast U.S. for weeks, draining reservoirs, priming the landscape for damaging wildfires and pushing politicians to implement water-saving measures. More than 58% of the Northeast is in moderate drought or worse, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor. The drought is particularly extreme in New Jersey, which has had its driest conditions in nearly 120 years. Some areas have experienced 40 days without measurable rain. A study released in the fall found that wildfires that swept Canada's woodlands last year released more greenhouse gases than some of the largest emitting countries.
- Flash floods in Libya: On Sept. 10, 2023, heavy rainfall caused two dams upstream of Derna to
  collapse, resulting in devastating flooding and leaving at least 5,923 dead, thousands missing,
  and more than 40,000 internally displaced, according to the United Nations, and large-scale
  destruction in eastern Libya, a country under transitional government and struggling to recover.
- Melting sea ice: Arctic sea ice retreated to near-historic lows in the Northern Hemisphere this summer, likely melting to its minimum extent for the year on Sept.11, 2024, according to researchers at NASA and the National Snow and Ice Data Center. The amount of sea ice in September 2024 was the sixth smallest on record, continuing a nearly two-decade streak. Sea ice in the southern polar regions of the planet was also low in 2024. Around Antarctica, scientists tracked near-record-low sea ice during the Southern Hemisphere's darkest and coldest months. "While changes in sea ice have been dramatic in the Arctic over several decades, Antarctic sea ice was relatively stable. But that has changed," said Walt Meier, a sea ice scientist at NSIDC. "It appears that global warming has come to the Southern Ocean."
- Hurricanes: The 2024 Atlantic hurricane season officially ended on Nov. 30. The Atlantic basin saw 18 named storms with 11 intensifying into hurricanes. Five of those were major hurricanes intensifying into Category 3 or higher. The season was the second costliest on record after 2017, inflicting at least \$232 billion in damages and 400 deaths overall, most of which was caused by four systems: Beryl, Debby, Helene and Milton. "There was a lot of eddy activity in the Gulf this summer, and those eddies seem to be carrying more thermal energy than they were 10 or 15 years ago," said Lynn "Nick" Shay, a professor of oceanography at the Rosenstiel School. Powerful Hurricane Helene made landfall on the Florida Gulf Coast as a Category 4 storm on Sept. 26, causing catastrophic flooding across the southern Appalachians, widespread wind damage from the Gulf Coast to the North Carolina mountains, and storm surge flooding along portions of western Florida. The storm killed more than 238 people in six states.
