#### **ESSAY PROMPT**

NOTE: *Contestants who do not write an essay will be disqualified.* Essay length is not a major grading factor as long as the essay is substantial and demonstrates a sincere effort to discuss the assigned topic. Cover as many corners of the issue as practical, including historical, political, economic, current events and cultural, when relevant. Avoid including your personal opinions, as more than enough information on the subject has been published. A focused, concise and specific essay beats a vague and rambling essay.

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### **ANSWER KEY**

#### ESSAY PROMPT

Neither the White House nor either house of Congress belong to the Democratic Party. #### DISCUSSION POINTS

- No leader. Rep. Jackie Speier (D., Calif.) was not able to name who the leader of the Democratic Party is on MSNBC last September. "There are a lot of leaders. What we need to kind of determine over the next, I'd say, six to eight months, is who really rises to the top," Speier said. In March, MSNBC's Kasie Hunt asked Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D., N.Y.) to name the leader of the Democratic Party and asked whether it was him. "We have a bunch of leaders. You know, I certainly am the leader of the Senate and I try to help represent the Democratic Party. But we have a lot of very good voices. It's much too premature to handicap 2020," Schumer said. Or was it Bernie Sanders, Joe Biden, Elizabeth Warren, Kirsten Gillibrand, Kamala Harris or Cory Booker.
- State elections. The party's performance in Virginia last fall was nothing short of a triumph. In the face of a vicious, race-baiting Republican campaign; manufactured controversies over Confederate monuments, (nonexistent) sanctuary cities, and kneeling NFL players not to mention a rain storm that singled-out the bluest parts of the state Democratic gubernatorial candidate Ralph Northam defeated Ed Gillespie by a near double-digit margin.
- State elections. A single vote in Newport News, Virginia, gave Democrats partial control of the state's House of Delegates and could help the party pass Medicaid expansion next year. After a recount, Democrat Shelly Simonds had 11,608 votes to Republican incumbent David Yancey's 11,607 votes in Virginia's 94th House District. Simonds' apparent victory which will head to a judicial panel on Wednesday for certification means Democrats and Republicans will have an even 50-50 split in the House of Delegates and will have to share power.
- Presidential disapproval. Polls from Gallup, CNN, Monmouth University and
  Quinnipiac University all showed Trump's approval rating between 33 percent and 37
  percent among the lowest numbers of his entire presidency. The Republican Party
  has more than two warring factions and disgust by many in the party's establishment
  for the President is palpable.
- *Democrats moving ahead*. CNN poll showed Democrats taking a nearly unheard-of 18-point lead in the 2018 midterm generic ballot, becoming just the latest poll to show a very bad environment for not just Trump but his party, too.
- No remedy. As Francis Wilkinson said in a 2017 article on Bloomberg View, "Democrats have no remedy for the contradictions of globalization, which has enriched the party's donor base and elevated an elite strain of multiculturalism, while helping to crush the industrial unions and workers who once powered Democratic campaigns. Democrats must sustain their unwieldy feminist, multiracial, multiclass coalition in the face of a virulent cultural backlash at home and an ugly anti-liberal trend abroad."
- More findings. Action for a Progressive Future, a non-profit organization, issued a 34-page report, "Autopsy: The Democratic Party in Crisis." Among the findings: (1) Aggregated data and analysis show that policies, operations and campaign priorities of the national Democratic Party undermined support and turnout from its base in the 2016 general election. Since then, the Democratic leadership has done little to indicate that it is heeding key lessons from the 2016 disaster. (2) After suffering from a falloff of turnout among people of color in the 2016 general election, the party appears to be losing ground with its most reliable voting bloc, African-American women. (3) One of the large groups with a voter-turnout issue is young people.
- Retirements and resignations. About twice as many Republicans than Democrats have announced that they will not be running for their House seats in 2018.
