NOTE: *Contestants who do not write an essay will be disqualified.* Essay length is not a major grading factor as long as the essay is substantial and demonstrates a sincere effort to discuss the assigned topic. Cover as many corners of the issue as practical, including historical, political, economic, current events and cultural, when relevant. Avoid including your personal opinions, as more than enough information on the subject has been published. A focused, concise and specific essay beats a vague and rambling essay.

ANSWER KEY

ESSAY PROMPT

The United States has had more mass shootings than any other country. Defined as four or more victims and excluding gang killings or domestic violence, about one-third of the world's mass shootings have occurred in the United States. Research from Harvard School of Public Health and Northeastern University has shown that mass shootings are occurring more frequently. Discuss the mass shootings that have occurred this academic year and what actions officials at the federal, state and local level have taken as well as what actions ordinary citizens have taken. Also discuss what actions have NOT been taken in light of the nearly 200 mass shootings that happened so far this academic year.

DISCUSSION POINTS

- Las Vegas shooting, the deadliest mass shooting in America. In the Oct. 1, 2017 Las Vegas shooting a gunman opened fire on a crowd of concertgoers at the Route 91 Harvest music festival on the Las Vegas Strip in Nevada, leaving 58 people dead and 851 injured. Attention focused on bump fire stocks, which the shooter, a 64-year-old man from Nevada, used to allow his semi-automatic rifles to fire at a rate similar to that of a fully automatic weapon.
- National ban on bump stocks. President Trump called on the Justice Department
 to change its regulations and formally ban bump stocks in February, following the
 deadly high school shooting in Parkland, Florida. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco,
 Firearms and Explosives closed the public comment period for its review of bump
 stock regulation. The ATF concluded that the devices were not regulated under existing
 gun laws. And it ruled that only Congress can act to ban them. That is a view shared
 by gun safety supporters, including Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., who pushed for a
 legislative ban last fall. The National Rifle Association opposed the ban.
- Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School. On Feb. 14, 2018, a mass shooting occurred at
 Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida. Seventeen people were
 killed and 17 more were wounded, all by bullets. The suspected perpetrator, 19-year-old
 Nikolas Cruz, was identified by witnesses and arrested shortly afterward. He confessed.
 Police and prosecutors have not yet offered a motive. However, Cruz had made earlier
 threats to be a school shooter. Teither the FBI nor local officials investigated.
- Legislation in Florida. Florida Gov. Rick Scott signed Senate Bill 7026 into law Friday, the first gun control legislation enacted in the state after the Parkland school massacre Feb. 14. The law, known as the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act, tightens gun control in several ways but also allows some teachers to be armed. One provision of the law raises the minimum age to purchase a firearm to 21 from 18. The NRA opposes this change. The appropriation includes more than \$69 million for mental health assistance in schools.
- School walkout. Students in Florida took a leadership role in planning a school walkout for March 14. Among their demands, participants want Congress to ban assault weapons, to require universal background checks before gun sales and to pass a gun violence restraining order law that would allow courts to disarm people who display warning signs of violent behavior.
- Assault rifle ban. After multiple instances of gun violence some gun control advocates
 have called for a ban on AR-15-style guns, similar to one the U.S. had in place until it
 expired in 2004. But that ban, which would need an act of Congress to be revived, isn't
 likely to go anywhere on Capitol Hill anytime soon, most congressional observers say.
 The NRA opposes any such ban.
- Sutherland Springs, Texas. Just one month after the tragic attack in Las Vegas, 26-year-old Devin Patrick Kelley killed at least 26 churchgoers and injured 20 others at First Baptist Church in Sutherland Springs, Texas. The Nov. 5, 2017 shooting was the deadliest mass shooting in the state's history.
- Kentucky school shooting. Sixteen people were wounded, two of them fatally, after a
 shooter opened fire at Marshall County High School in western Kentucky, authorities
 said. Four others sustained various injuries Jan. 23, 2018. A 15-year-old male student
 was arrested at the scene. The suspect, armed with a handgun, just walked into the
 school and started shooting.
- Terrorist groups. None of these attacks were carried out by known terrorist groups.
