In the fourth paragraph, "impressive" is an opinion. Instead, be specific.

In the final paragraph, whether the word "Metroplex" is required or not after Dallas-Forth Worth (note the hyphen) is unclear according to AP style. However, it does make it more clear that it's the DFW area, not just two cities.

Tips for judges

Part 3

This section is ONLY ranked to break a tie in the combined scores of parts 1 and 2. Assign no points.

Judges should compare the papers of students who tied, ranking them accordingly.

When grading part 3, holistically read the changes the student indicated starting with the highest level of editing. Remember, there are multiple levels of copy editing. The notes off to the side on the answer key indicate higher levels of editing errors. Those should be awarded more value if the student fixes the problem or indicates it should be fixed.

No. 1 "Whoever" is the subject of the dependent clause.

No. 3 The maxim that "between" introduces two items and "among" introduces more than two covers most questions about how to use these words.

The phrase "such as..." is essential and, therefore, should not be set off by commas. The Oxford comma, however, is not essential.

No. 4 When the student changes the verb in the first sentence from "voiced" to "said," they can take out the "that." Because fixing one error introduced this possible change, that would count as one error. Keeping the "that," however, is not wrong. Cutting out the lead as written is a subjective decision.

In the first paragraph it says the data was for the first half of the year. Yet it was released on March 19. Something is wrong.

In the second paragraph it says that wind and coal, which together account for 43% of energy, are dwarfed by natural gas. So natural gas has to be more than 14%.

Note the misspelling of Swift in the final paragraph. That's a major error.

There are several ways to punctuate the last sentence.

Students might note that this is a one-source story.
