

POTENTIAL DISCUSSION POINTS PREPARED Feb. 13, 2023 might include, but should not be limited to...

- *Intro* A University of Texas Texas Politics Project poll found a significant increase in Texans' skepticism about the responsiveness of state government. The plurality of Texans, 46%, said the state government in Austin "mostly ignores" the needs of Texas residents..
- *People* President of the Senate, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick (R), has served since Jan. 20, 2015. More than anyone else, Patrick controls the agenda including controlling the budgeting process as a leader of the Legislative Budget Board. Speaker of the House Dade Phelan (R) has been speaker since Jan. 12, 2021. Republicans have sizeable majorities in both the Senate and the House. The governor of Texas is weaker than other states' governors but can call a special session to deal with issues on his agenda and can veto legislation.
- Money Legislators have a historic \$32.7 billion surplus to work with. According to a University
 of Houston poll, the median Texan believes that between \$10 and \$14 billion of the recordbreaking budget surplus should be saved.
- School funding State Rep. Gina Hinojosa, D-Austin, filed HB31, which would basing the state's public education funding system on student enrollment instead of average attendance. Texas has about 5.5 million K-12 students, but only about 92% of them regularly attended classes last school year, meaning schools missed out on millions in funding from the remaining students. Rep. Donna Howard, D-Austin, filed HB882, which would increase that amount to \$7,075 and would adjust it annually according to inflation.
- School choice Gov. Greg Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and the Texas GOP have listed school choice as a legislative priority. Sen. Mayes Middleton, R-Galveston, filed Senate Bill 176, which could become the most expansive school choice program in the state. It would create an education savings account program that would allow parents to use state funds to pay for their children's private school, online schooling or private tutors. According to a poll from the University of Houston released Jan. 30, 61% of Texans support educational vouchers for low-income families and 53% support vouchers for all families regardless of income. Texas already practices school choice, as parents can choose to send their children to free charter schools or transfer schools within or outside of their district.
- *Teacher shortages* Issues like low pay, working overtime, health worries during the pandemic and being caught in the middle of Texas' culture wars have left Texas struggling to fill its teacher vacancies. Rep. James Talarico, D-Round Rock, filed HB1548, which would give teachers a \$15,000 pay raise.
- *School safety* School safety is on top of the priority list for both Republicans and Democrats. Legislators are discussing ways to make schools safer and how to provide more mental health services for students. Legislators from both parties have said they will set aside \$600 million for school safety. For example, Rep. Shawn Nicole Thierry, D-Houston, has filed HB801, which would require districts to have only one entrance per school campus.
- *Gambling* SJR 17 would require approval by a majority of voters in a November constitutional referendum. It would allow one casino resort in each of the state's four major metro areas along with limited casino gambling at horse and greyhound racetracks and legalized sports betting. It also would allow the state's three recognized tribal communities to operate slot machines or casino gambling. In the University of Houston poll, 75% of Texans support the passage of SJR 17, including 41% strongly support it.
- *Gun regulation* Influenced by parents from Uvalde, Sen. Ronald Gutierrez, D-San Antonio, filed SB145 which would raise the minimum age for buying or renting firearms from 18 to 21.

 LGBTQ restrictions — Reps. Steve Toth, R-The Woodlands, and Jared Patterson, R-Frisco, filed HB631 and HB1155, respectively. Both are similar to legislation in Florida dubbed the "Don't Say Gay" law. HB631 would ban schools from teaching students from kindergarten through fifth grade about sexual orientation or gender identity. HB1155 would extend that ban to eighth grade.

Other issues — legalization of marijuana, ethnic studies courses in public schools,
