ESSAY PROMPT

Russia's war against Ukraine is causing a humanitarian, social and economic crisis for the Ukrainian people. Further, this full-scale military invasion is also having an impact outside Ukraine. Discuss some of the political, economic, scientific, social and cultural consequences of the war, particularly consequences on the United States.

POTENTIAL DISCUSSION POINTS PREPARED March. 15, 2023 might include, but should not be limited to...

- Food Blockades of Ukrainian grain exports have worsened hunger in some of the world's most
 vulnerable regions. Even as international efforts have helped to resume grain shipments, the
 situation remains dire. According to the International Rescue Committee, in East Africa, for
 instance, a perfect storm of continued drought, the blockade, and the economic fallout from the
 war is causing mass starvation. Ukraine and Russia are key exporters of wheat, barley, corn and
 cooking oil, particularly to African and Middle Eastern countries. Without urgent international
 funding, the lives of millions of people are at stake.
- Fuel Russia is one of the world's largest producers of oil and fuel. European countries have
 banned the Russian oil, gas and diesel they relied on, which initially caused a steep spike in
 prices. And Russia is targeting key energy production facilities in Ukraine as residents try to
 survive winter. The prosecutor general's office of Ukraine has documented 240 Russian attacks
 on the country's energy facilities from the start of the full-scale invasion until the end of
 January. Another 15 attacks have targeted the power grid in February so far.
- Refugees By January of 2023, more than 8 million refugees had fled Ukraine in what the World
 Health Organization describes as "the largest movement of people in the European Region since
 the Second World War." Poland has granted protection to over 1.2 million Ukrainian refugees
 while other nearby countries Hungary, Romania, Slovakia and Moldova have each given safety
 to tens of thousands of Ukrainian refugees. Czechia is hosting the most refugees per capita in
 Europe, having granted protection to almost half a million people.
- Border crossings From the time Russia started its invasion of Ukraine on Feb. 24, 2022, until Jan. 24, 2023, more than 17.92 million border crossings from Ukraine to other countries were recorded, according to Statista.
- Economic aide From Jan. 24, 2022, to Nov. 20, 2022, the U.S. provided around \$52 billion in bilateral financial, humanitarian and military aid to Ukraine. The second-highest value of commitments was recorded from the European Union institutions at approximately \$38 billion. U.S. aid to Ukraine totals \$68 billion, and the White House asked Congress for another \$37.7 billion. In the spring, the new Congress will consider aid in the context of the administration's proposed FY 2024 budget.
- Politics As reported on CNN on Dec. 6, 2022, Americans still strongly back the U.S. providing
 aid for Ukraine's fight against Russia, but there has been a decline in support among Republicans
 as some prominent GOP politicians and media figures express opposition to the U.S. providing
 additional support to Kyiv. The poll from the Chicago Council on Global Affairs found that most
 Americans still support aiding Ukraine 65% support sending weapons, 66% support economic
 aid, 75% support increasing sanctions on Russia, and 73% support accepting Ukrainian refugees
 to the U.S.
- Russia's defense budget Russian President Vladimir Putin approved increasing the size of Russia's armed forces to 1.5 million from 1 million. Still, officials in Ukraine said they believe that Russia is no longer able to provide new citizens conscripted for war with weapons and equipment. Russia has announced a 2023 defense budget of approximately \$84 billion, more than 40% higher than its initial 2023 budget announced in 2021.
- *More politics* By the time Congress convened in January, with a Republic majority in the House, consensus was changing. Republican senator J.D. Vance wanted oversight on the billions already allocated to Kyiv. And others started questioning the expenditures entirely.
- Tanks mixed up in politics After some tense negotiations in which Berlin made clear that it
 did not want to be the first to provide Kyiv with tanks, which Moscow will no doubt view as a
 significant escalation of NATO involvement in the conflict, the U.S. and Germany agreed to send
 battle tanks to Ukraine.
