# Writing Effective Legislation



## Types of Legislation

- Bill Proposed new law
  - Common mistakes to avoid
    - Telling us what the law intends to do. Do tell us, just do it.
    - Including arguments for the legislation in the text of the Bill. Save it for the Debate.
- Resolution A formal statement from Congress
  - Common mistakes to avoid
    - Thinking this becomes a law
- Amendment Change to The Constitution
  - Common mistakes to avoid
    - Feeling the need to write too much
    - Not keeping with the flow of the Constitutional language.
    - Writing as though this will be inserted into the actual Constitution rather than added as an addendum to the Constitution.




# Legislative Intent

- Debatability Is there Aff & Neg ground?
- Education Research & debate will enhance students depth & breadth of knowledge on the presented issue.





### Scope



- Impact Problem addressed is of widespread concern on the national level – not a localized problem.
- Relevance Problem of current concern to citizens and legislators of the US



## Need & Feasibility

 Appropriate Agent - Legislation uses the appropriate authority to address the presented problem

 Creativity- Provides a solution to a new problem OR gives a unique solution to a commonly debated problem AND does not recycle recently or commonly

debated issues.

- Writing Concise, fluent, and organized.
- Mechanics Avoids grammar
   and spelling errors






