The UIL/TJC-Tyler Student Activities Conference will acquaint students and coaches with the nature and rules of the UIL academic contests. Conference workshops help prepare you for the Spring Meet competitions and provide opportunities to meet state directors and experts for each contest. The conference is free and there is no pre-registration.

CAR PARKING: Ample car parking space exists at all four corners of the campus. Please park in a legitimate space, and not in handicap spots or fire lanes. Parking lots S-23, S-14, S-4 on the online TJC Campus Map is recommended. Note: Nutcrackers auditions are happening on campus the same day. Parking will be at a premium.

BUS DROPS & PARKING: There are two main areas for drop-offs. For Theatre students, the best place is off Fifth Street, on South Mahon Street near Wise Cultural Arts and the Rogers Palmer Performing Arts Center (between buildings 30 and 32 on TJC Campus map). All others, drop off in front Rogers Nursing & Health Sciences building off Fifth Street on Fleishal (Building 6) OR the Rogers Student Center Apache Rooms (Building 21). Buses should park in the East Parking Lots off Fifth Street and Palmer (S/R14) OR in adjacent parking lot to Rogers Nursing & Health Sciences building (S-23).
