My objective is to ensure that the Ready Writing contest aligns seamlessly with the standards upheld at the state level.



FOUNDATION

Feedback from my writers have revealed two main factors in what they perceive to be successful essays.

Factor One

Deeper Message:
The prompt inspires the
writer to examine their place
in the world.

Factor Two

Writing for Understanding: Ready Writing is a way to convey argument/meaning

COMPLEXITY

Complexity extends beyond the use of sophisticated vocabulary; it encompasses the manner in which we structure our sentences and transition between examples and commentary. Embracing complexity steers us away from formulaic writing.

THE APPROACH

Reading the Prompt
 Use the prompt as a springboard. Read for a deeper meaning.

Responding to the Prompt
 Have students respond to the prompt instead of quoting or explaining it.

THE CONTEST

Do not focus on other writers. Some writers intentionally finish quickly in attempt to intimidate opponents.

- Examine the first thought that comes to your mind, then toss it. If you thought of it first, then chances are that almost everyone else in the room did as well.
- Take the extra time to brainstorm if needed. We do want to be mindful of the time, but it should not be at the cost of rushing our thoughts.

THE ESSAY

Introductions

All types of introductions should be considered valid. Having the student choose their style helps them break the ice.

Commentary

Do they examine their place in society? Do they make text-to-self and text-to-world/society connections? Do they explain how their examples relate to theif thesis?

• Examples

Examples can be subjective.

Students should look to apply
them appropriately first. MLK was
influential but used too much.

Style

Use metaphors, symbolism, irony, etc. Step out of the comfort zone and experiment with the language. Let them figure out what to bend. Break the formula.

THE "PROBLEM"

Is Ready Writing subjective? Indeed, it is. Students and coaches may perceive their efforts as flawless despite not achieving the desired outcome. Certain students might present impressive evidence of extensive reading without offering substantial analysis. Nevertheless, when considering the collective input of judges, a consensus is reached regarding the standards of effective writing.


