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Sports Etiquette

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Sports Etiquette is Important

- It creates credibility for your publication
- You can be removed from the field, court, track, etc. if you don't show sports etiquette
- It will help you gain respect and allow you more access in the future

General Rules of Etiquette

- 1. You are there to cover the news, not make it.
- 2. Comply, within reason, of any request made by the coaches, athletic staff, or officials.
- 3. Always know where you are allowed to be and where you aren't allowed to be.
- 4. Don't write distasteful stories or post distasteful photos.

General Rules of Etiquette

- 5. Report the news, don't be a PR person
- 6. Do not cheer in press areas
- 7. Don't use on-camera flash



Football Etiquette

- 1. Always stand about 3-5 yards away from the sideline
- 2. Avoid the coaches' box



Basketball Etiquette

- 1. You can shoot from anywhere except in the lane (UIL rule)
- 2. You're free to shoot from the stands
- 3. Avoid interacting with players on the bench



Volleyball Etiquette

 Don't sit / stand too closely to the court and be ready to bail out if the play comes your way



Baseball / Softball Etiquette

- 1. Your team's dugout is usually the best place to shoot if they will allow you there
- 2. 5 or 6 yards back from the foul line extended from first and third base is also fair game (if the officials let you stand there)
- 3. Last resort is behind the fence

Soccer Etiquette

- Similar to other field sports
- Be aware of kicked balls



Cross Country Etiquette

- Do not get in the way of the runners
- Try to position yourself somewhere where you can quickly move to other portions of the track



Track Etiquette

- Give runners around 20-30 meters if you are shooting straight on the finish line
- Sometimes media will not be allowed in the center of the track so plan accordingly



Golf Etiquette

- Once a player has addressed the ball, don't take photos until the player makes contact with the ball
- Don't walk on the fairway or on the green, or in the line of shot
- Be quiet and respectful



Making Friends

- Journalism is about networking
- Talk to people on the sidelines and in the press boxes
- Show them you take your work seriously and they will respect that



Covering UIL State Events

- You must request media credentials via the UIL website for all state events except golf and band
- Schools will be issued 3 media credentials for student media to all state events except football, in which case the max is 6

Covering UIL State Events

- The UIL owns the commercial rights to any photographs or videos made by credential holders at state events
- State events are much stricter about enforcing the previous etiquette guidelines.
 Failure to abide by those guidelines could result in being removed from the venue

Covering the UIL Playoffs

- 5A and 6A stadiums normally require stadium issued media credentials to access the field and press box
- 1A-4A are usually okay with school issued media credentials
- Contact the opposing team's AD to be added to the list for media

Requesting Media Credentials

- Bi-District-Regionals, you will most likely need to email the athletic director of wherever your game will be played
- For regional tournaments, email your region coordinator
- State credentials are always requested on the UIL website
