A Bill to Impose a National Carbon Tax

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States will implement a national tax on all non-renewable
3		energy sources in order to spur development of cleaner energy sources
4		and decrease emissions. There will be a 5% tax enforced upon all
5		companies manufacturing, refining, and processing these non-renewable
6		energy sources.
7	SECTION 2.	Non-renewable energy sources are defined as energy sources that
8		release large amounts of greenhouse gases and cannot be easily
9		replenished such as coal, oil, natural gas, etc.
10	SECTION 3.	The US Department of Energy, the Environmental Protection Agency
11		(EPA) and the IRS will collaborate to oversee the implementation of this
12		bill.
13		A. The US Department of Energy will provide subsidies to ensure proper
14		incentive to comply with the tax.
15		B. The Environmental Protection Agency will monitor the effect the
16		carbon tax has on the environment.
17		C. The IRS will enforce and collect the tax revenue.
18	SECTION 4.	This bill takes effect on January 1, 2028.
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Enact Safety Initiatives in all United States School Districts

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	A Bill to enact safety across all school districts by administering security
3		systems including metal detectors, access control, fences, gates, door
4		alarms, and resource officers.
5	SECTION 2.	A: Access control can be defined as a security technique that regulates
6		who or what can view or use resources in a computing environment.
7		B: Resource officers is a school resource officer sworn law-enforcement
8		officer with arrest powers who works, either full or part time, in a schoo
9		setting.
10	SECTION 3.	The Department of Education and Homeland Security will oversee the
11		Enforcement of this bill.
12		A. The funding mechanisms for this bill is through Title I funding.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on September 1, 2025.
14	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void

A Bill to Modify Restrictions on Guns in the United States to Decrease Shootings and Gun-Related Deaths.

1	BE II ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The sale, transfer, and possession of assault weapons will be banned, a
3		national gun buyback program will be established, and stricter
4		regulations will be placed on the purchase and ownership of firearms.
5	SECTION 2.	The following definitions are provided:
6		A. National gun buyback program: A government-funded initiative
7		designed to encourage the voluntary surrender of firearms by
8		offering financial compensation to individuals who turn in their
9		weapons.
10		B. Stricter regulations: These regulations include enhanced background
11		checks that encompass mental health, domestic violence, and
12		criminal history; and a requirement for prospective gun owners to
13		complete certified safety training before acquiring a firearm.
14	SECTION 3.	The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives will be
15		responsible for the implementation and enforcement of the following
16		provisions.
17		The Department of Justice will provide legal support and prosecute any
18		violations related to the sale, transfer, or possession of banned firearms.
19	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on FY 2027.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void

A Bill to Negotiate Drug Pricing to Make Healthcare Accessible

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	This congress shall negotiate pricing for the top 50 most prescribed
3		medications in the US.
4	SECTION 2.	A. "Top 50 most prescribed medications" refers to a list of drugs most
5		commonly prescribed, as determined by the Department of Health and
6		Human Services (HHS).
7		B. "Negotiated Price" refers to the maximum amount a medication can
8		be priced at in accordance to negotiations made by this congress and
9		pharmaceutical companies
10	SECTION 3.	The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) shall make sure
11		that all pharmaceutical companies are in accordance with the mandated
12		price caps.
13		A. HHS shall annually negotiate prices with pharmaceutical companies to
14		establish a maximum price scale for each drug in the top 50 list.
15		B. HHS shall penalize non-compliant pharmaceutical companies with a
16		fine equal to 10% of the previous year's total sales of the non-
17		compliant drug in the United States.
18	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Fund High-Speed Rail Development

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The Department of Transportation shall allocate \$100 billion of funding
3		for the development and implementation of high-speed rail systems
4		across the United States.
5	SECTION 2.	A High-Speed Rail System is defined as a rail network capable of
6		sustained speeds exceeding 150 miles per hour.
7	SECTION 3.	The Department of Transportation shall work in collaboration with state
8		and local authorities to identify and prioritize high-speed rail corridors
9		based on factors such as population density, transportation demand, and
10		potential economic impacts.
11		A. Funding will come from the Department of Defense budget.
12	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect immediately upon passage.
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Increase US Access to Strategic Minerals

1	WHEREAS,	Rare earth elements and other strategic minerals are critical components
2		of many manufacturing and defense technologies vital to US interests;
3		and
4	WHEREAS,	Many of these minerals are controlled by a few countries or corporations
5		with the capacity to mine, develop and/or refine them; and
6	WHEREAS,	Increasing worldwide demand for these elements in computer
7		technologies, energy storage devices, alternative energy, electric vehicle
8		production, and defense technologies have given these nations and
9		companies unprecedented control over the markets on these strategic
10		minerals; and
11	WHEREAS,	Recent actions by China, which controls more than half of the world's
12		supply of these minerals, have indicated that country's willingness to use
13		access to these elements as leverage in foreign policy; and
14	WHEREAS,	Access to these minerals is essential to long-range US economic and
15		military goals; now, therefore, be it
16	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled should provide subsidies to
17		encourage the domestic development of mining and refining capacity of
18		strategic minerals and/or the development of viable alternatives.

A Bill to Reduce the Prices of Diabetic Medical Supplies to Financially Support Diabetic Americans

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States Government will enforce 65% price caps on Insulin and
3		other diabetic supplies. These price caps will be enforced through the U.S
4		government and to the major companies who sell the products in
5		question.
6	SECTION 2.	The major companies include, but are not limited to, Novo Nordisk,
7		Dexcom, and Omnipod.
8		A. Diabetic Americans are defined as Americans suffering from and
9		diagnosed with Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes.
10		B. Diabetic supplies include, but are not limited to, Insulin, Pumps, Pens,
11		and CGM (continuous glucose monitoring) systems.
12	SECTION 3.	The Department of Human and Health Services will be tasked with
13		enforcing this legislation.
14		A. The Department of Human and Health Services will enforce a 5% tax
15		on the profits of the major companies that refuse to lower their
16		prices.
17		B. If the companies refuse to lower the prices after 1 year, The
18		Department of Human and Health Services will decide the financial
19		consequences.
20	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.
21	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Raise Federal Minimum Wage to Account for Inflation and Increase in Cost of Living

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	This bill is to enact a new minimum wage of not less than \$10.00 per
3		hour.
4	SECTION 2.	Inflation and the rising cost of living necessitate the raise of minimum
5		wage to \$10.00 per hour.
6		A. Current statistics show that the state with the highest cost of living
7		going by federal minimum wage would need an increase to 10.00 per
8		hour to be able to afford the average apartment without any other
9		bills.
10		B. Inflation has increased by 46.61% since the established federal
11		minimum wage of 7.25 in 2009, thus meaning that the dollar has
12		continued to decrease in value without any change in pay.
13	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Labor will oversee the enforcement of
14		this bill.
15	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.
16	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to End Military Support for Taiwan

1	WHEREAS,	Cross-strait relations between the People's Republic of China (PRC) and
2		the Republic of China (ROC) have become an increasingly tentative issue

4	WHEREAS,	with defense commitments to Taiwanese stringing the United States to
5		the conflict, US-China relations have seen massive deterioration; and
6	WHEREAS,	Chinese retaliation and militarization poses as a critical hazard to regional
7		and global security; and
8	WHEREAS,	American activities in Taiwan have served as a major catalyst for said
9		Chinese mobilization; now, therefore, be it
10	RESOLVED,	The United States shall end military support for Taiwan; and, be it
11	FURTHER RES	SOLVED, That the United States shall work with the PRC and ROC to host
12		cross-strait negotiations to diffuse tensions

The Arming Mexico with the Intent of Gaining Obligatory Security (A.M.I.G.O.S.) Act

1	BE II ENACTE	D BY THIS OIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States will reform the Mexican Armed Forces (MAF) to bring
3		them closer as an ally, increase the security of Mexico, and pave the way
4		for Mexico's membership into NATO.
5		A. The United States will collaborate with The Federal Government of
6		Mexico with the purpose of Mexico eventually requesting to join
7		NATO.
8		B. The US will start training Mexican Armed Forces inside of Mexico
9		C. Mexico shall be given modernized military equipment to outdated
10		variants.
11	SECTION 2.	Modernized military equipment shall consist of 50 M1 Abrams tanks, 500
12		JLTVs, 15 F-16 fighter jets, 50 UH-60 helicopters, 150 M1126 Infantry
13		carrier vehicles, and 130 M1128 Mobile gun systems,
14	SECTION 3.	The US Department of State and Department of Defense will be
15		responsible for the implementation of this legislation.
16		A. The DOS will give military aid directly to the Mexican government and
17		will be responsible for conducting audits every year to ensure that
18		military aid is spent as defense expenditure. If 75% of aid in one year
19		is not spent on defense, all aid will be terminated.
20	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.
21	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

The Democracy Act of 2024

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	Congress shall require Ranked Choice Voting for elections of both
3		Senators and Representatives in all states, used with Multi-Member
4		Districts.
5	SECTION 2.	Ranked Choice Voting is defined as a system where each voter ranks
6		candidates for an office in order of preference.
7	SECTION 3.	For Multi-Member Districts, For states with six or more Representatives,
8		districts must be fewer than the total Representatives, with elections
9		only for these districts
10		A. Each district must have equal population as practicable per the U.S.
11		Constitution.
12		B. Each district elects 3 to 5 Representatives.
13	SECTION 4.	States and Local Office Unchanged. – This Act does not affect how states
14		conduct elections for state or local offices or establish districts for such
15		elections.
16	SECTION 5.	Expanding the Size of the House. – The number of Representatives shall
17		be the total U.S. population divided by the population of the smallest
18		state.
19	SECTION 6.	This bill shall go into effect January 1, 2026.
20	SECTION 7.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Eliminate Ghost Guns

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The sale, purchase, or ownership of firearms which lack identifying serial
3		numbers (i.e., ghost guns) will be prohibited in the United States and its
4		territories.
5	SECTION 2.	Ghost guns are firearms which lack any serial number by which they can
6		be identified; they are typically assembled from parts by the user.
7	SECTION 3.	The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives will be
8		responsible for the implementation and enforcement of the following
9		provisions.
10		A. All gun parts of more than one square inch in size manufactured in
11		the United States or imported into the US must include a traceable
12		serial number.
13		B. The manufacture and/or assembly of any 3-D printed weapon or
14		weapon parts will be prohibited.
15		C. The sale of any weapon lacking identifying serial numbers will be
16		punishable by a fine of \$1000 per weapon and/or up to 10 years in
17		federal prison.
18		D. The ownership or possession of firearms lacking serial numbers will
19		be punishable by up to 5 years in federal prison.
20		E. Collectors items manufactured prior the standard use of serial
21		numbers will be exempt from these provisions. However, any of
22		these exempted weapons must be permanently disabled and unable
23		to fire.
24	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026.
25	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
